Be an Upstander (5th- 6th Grade)

Recommended Pathway: Focus on an Age Appropriate Introduction to the Holocaust (35-40 min.)



Illinois Holocaust Museum & Education Center partnered with the Archdiocese of Chicago Office of Catholic Schools to create this publication, providing resources and suggested activities for educators to align their teaching of the Holocaust to the Archdiocese of Chicago Religion Curriculum Priority Standards for Grades PK-8 (2020). We encourage educators to explore these suggested activities to incorporate into their interdisciplinary instruction—using all of them or only a few, and implementing them as-written or with modifications to meet students' specific needs. Through these lessons and activities, students will gain a deeper understanding of the human dimension of the Holocaust, while exploring topics through the lens of Catholic faith, tradition, and values.

GENERAL ACTIVITIES

ACTIVITY #1: What's in Your Suitcase: An Introduction to the Holocaust

Consider designing a web quest for students to explore the activities of the following organizations:

- [Archdiocese of Chicago Immigration Ministry](#): Click on "Pastoral Migratoria." Read and discuss the work of this ministry of the Archdiocese. Consider making use of the case scenarios, discussion questions, and prayer prompts in the formation booklet resources.
- [USCCB Justice for Immigrants](#): Click on the PDF at the top of the page to read about Justice for Immigrants. Click on the "Areas of Focus" tab at the top of the page and read about the work of JFI in each area. Click on the "Faces of Migration" tab and invite students to read a chosen story about someone who has migrated to the U.S. Discuss ways in which the Gospel calls Christians to act as upstanders on behalf of those who are new to our communities.
- [Jesuit Refugee Service](#): Click on "About Us" and read the history and values of JRS. Click on "Our Work" and learn about what JRS does in communities around the world. Click on "Take Action" and invite students to choose a prayer to incorporate into the classroom experience of daily prayer and reflection.

ACTIVITY #3: Eyewitness to the Holocaust: Diet Eman

Invite students to visit the [We Are Salt and Light](#) website (USCCB). Click on "Success Stories" in the drop-down tab on the upper left corner of the screen. Help students to navigate through the collection of "success stories" that illustrate how Catholic communities across the U.S. have invested in peace and justice efforts in various ways. Allow students an opportunity to share the success stories they chose with a partner or small group. Facilitate a conversation about topics of peace and justice that are of interest to the students. Help students to design a project that advocates for social justice in connection to their areas of interest. Assist students in writing a class "success story" that summarizes the project, student learnings, and goals for further outreach work.

- How can you use the gifts and talents that you've named in your self-portrait to help others who are lacking basic needs?
- How can affirmation of your personal identity, gifts, and talents help you begin to discern your vocation? How might you be called to make a positive difference in the world?
